“It’s Time to Get Serious”

Tomorrow’s Water Supply & Today’s Water Conservation

Water has been very much in the news lately as we deal with record dry conditions across California and heightened concerns regarding challenges facing our statewide water system. California’s water system is an integration of local, state and federal facilities – tying together almost every region of the state. Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD), our wholesale import water provider, uses part of the statewide system to convey water to its 18 million customers that must travel hundreds of miles from the Colorado River and the Sacramento – San Joaquin Bay Delta (Delta) in Northern California to reach the tap at your home or business.

Population growth, climate change, regulatory/environmental constraints to protect aquatic species and lack of investment in conveyance and storage infrastructure at a state level represent some of the challenges facing our statewide water system. Bob Hill, El Toro Water District (ETWD) General Manager, said “while local agencies have been investing heavily over the past decade in programs such as water recycling, water use efficiency and regional storage projects, investments in our statewide system have not kept pace”. ***However, Governor Schwarzenegger and other legislators are beginning to recognize that our economy, our environment and our way of life depend upon continued investment and balanced management of our statewide water system.*** Hill states that “ETWD and other south county water agencies will be working with the Association of California Water Agencies, MWD, the Governor and legislators to ensure that solutions to the statewide system challenges are comprehensive and equitably beneficial to all of California.” **Stay tuned as we will keep you informed and educated on statewide water system discussions.**

One of the most economical on-going solutions to ensuring that we have an adequate supply of water for the near and far term, is the efficient use of every drop of water we deliver to the customer. In August, MWD launched “It’s Time to Get Serious” water conservation campaign. El Toro, in partnership with MWD, is requesting residential and business customers to use water wisely. Today

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the request is voluntary but another dry winter may cause MWDSC to reduce deliveries that will impact each and every one of us. The record dry weather on the Colorado River (driest 8-year periods since 1910) and the eastern Sierras has caused MWDSC to draw upon reserves to meet higher than normal 2007 water demands. Every drop saved today, leaves more in reserve for tomorrow. Remember conserving water also conserves energy by reducing the amount of water that must be conveyed hundreds of miles to reach southern California. **You can do your part to conserve our most precious resource by following these simple water saving tips:**

- ◆ Run only full loads in the clothes washer and dishwasher
- ◆ Replace older, inefficient clothes washers
- ◆ Don't leave water running when rinsing dishes
- ◆ Turn off water when brushing teeth
- ◆ Shorten showers
- ◆ Fix leaky toilets and faucets
- ◆ Replace older, high volume flushing toilets
- ◆ Water before 6 a.m. or after 8 p.m.
- ◆ Don't overwater!
- ◆ Reset irrigation controllers and replace batteries
- ◆ Adjust sprinklers to prevent overspray and runoff
- ◆ Repair leaks and broken sprinkler heads
- ◆ Add 2" to 3" of mulch around trees and plants to reduce evaporation
- ◆ Install water-efficient drip irrigation system for trees shrubs and flowers
- ◆ Upgrade to a "Smartimer" irrigation controller that automatically adjusts watering times
- ◆ Renovate landscape with beautiful native and California Friendly plants. Plant in the fall
- ◆ Use a broom instead of hose to clean driveways and sidewalks
- ◆ Don't leave the hose running while washing your car- use a bucket and positive shut-off nozzle

El Toro Water District Successfully Completes LAFCO Process

The District successfully completed the Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) Municipal Service Review (MSR) and Sphere of Influence (SOI) update for the El Toro Water District. The process took approximately six months and involved (1) educating LAFCO staff about the role ETWD plays locally and regionally to ensure adequate, reliable and efficient services to the communities that we serve and, (2) the preparation and submittal of multiple documents/reports covering the District's near and long term governance, organizational, financial, infrastructure, planning and communication status.

LAFCO is a regulatory agency with county-wide jurisdiction, established by state law to encourage the orderly and efficient provision of services such as water, sewer and fire protection. A MSR is a study conducted by LAFCO to analyze the service levels and needs of all local agencies and cities under LAFCO's purview. A sphere of influence is a planning tool adopted and used by LAFCO to designate probable future boundary and service areas for a city or special district.

The LAFCO Commission conducted a public hearing to review a LAFCO staff generated ETWD MSR/SOI report and to consider public input on same. The MSR assessed the District's ability to efficiently and reliably meet future water and sewer requirements within its service area. The final MSR/SOI report concluded that the District is satisfactorily positioned to meet the water and sewer demands of the Cities we serve today and into the future.

The independent determinations made by LAFCO acknowledge our commitment to efficient and responsive governance, administration, operations, planning, finance, and customer relations. We look forward to maintaining those high standards.◆

Suggested Weekly Watering Schedule

Weekly Watering Schedule for Spray Head Irrigation Systems

	Turf Grass	Trees, shrubs groundcover
September	4 days 2 cycles of 3 minutes	2 days 2 cycles of 4 minutes
October	3 days 2 cycles of 3 minutes	2 days 2 cycles of 3 minutes
November	2 days 2 cycles of 3 minutes	1 day 2 cycles of 4 minutes
